From the PCO President

The first meeting of the reactivated Pullman Civic Organization was held Wednesday evening, April 20, 1960 to protect our community from demolition. Today, Pullman is recognized as a National Historical Park. The PCO is the epitome of the Margaret Mead quote, "Never doubt that a small group of thoughtful, committed citizens can change the world; indeed, it's the only thing that ever has."

The May PCO meeting marks the launch of our annual membership drive. Why support the PCO through your membership? Let's look at a year in review.

THE PCO INFORMS OUR COMMUNITY.

This year, the PCO hosted presentations ranging from Property After Death by Cook County Clerk Karen Yarbrough to the Roseland Community Medical District Master Plan by our very own Darrell Hill, a Commissioner for the project. The Beman Committee organized the first-ever Window Expo showcasing many of the leading manufacturers of historic replacement windows operating in Pullman today as well as a Building Permit and Permit Fee Waiver Workshop outlining the City of Chicago's new Express Permit Program that now automatically waives fees for landmark properties. At meetings, the PCO highlighted legislation such as the Reimagining Hotel Florence Act (HB2878) and numerous developments impacting our community including the 111th Pullman Metra Station, I-94 at 111th Street IDOT Interchange Study, CTA Red Line Extension, Lake Calumet Bike Network Study, and NPS/IDNR Joint Management Plan. In fact, with the bipartisan Infrastructure Law signed in 2021 allocating \$3.5 billion for EPA Superfund sites, the PCO advocated for the Acme Steel Coke Plant site adjacent to Big Marsh to be prioritized, which was recently one of only five sites nationally to be added to the list.

THE PCO SUPPORTS OUR COMMUNITY.

This year, the PCO collaborated on the 50th Annual Historic Pullman House Tour, the proceeds from which fund the Beman Committee's Façade Reimbursement Program that directly goes back into our neighborhood. The Façade Reimbursement Program also celebrated its 20th anniversary and the Façade Legacy Project recently completed their collection of architectural drawings for the entire Pullman Historic District after receiving the Timuel D. Black Jr. Grant from Landmarks Illinois. Furthermore, the Beman Committee facilitated a series of hands-on preservation workshops with experts in the field that included fixing plaster, restoring windows, and repairing masonry and mortar. The Safety Committee collaborated with both CPD and CAPS and the Community Improvement Committee worked closely with city and aldermanic offices to promote the welfare of our neighborhood. Additionally, the PCO raised over \$5,000 to support the multitude of volunteers from our community who tirelessly provided for the basic needs of hundreds of newcomer asylum seekers housed at the 5th District Police Department.

THE PCO GATHERS OUR COMMUNITY.

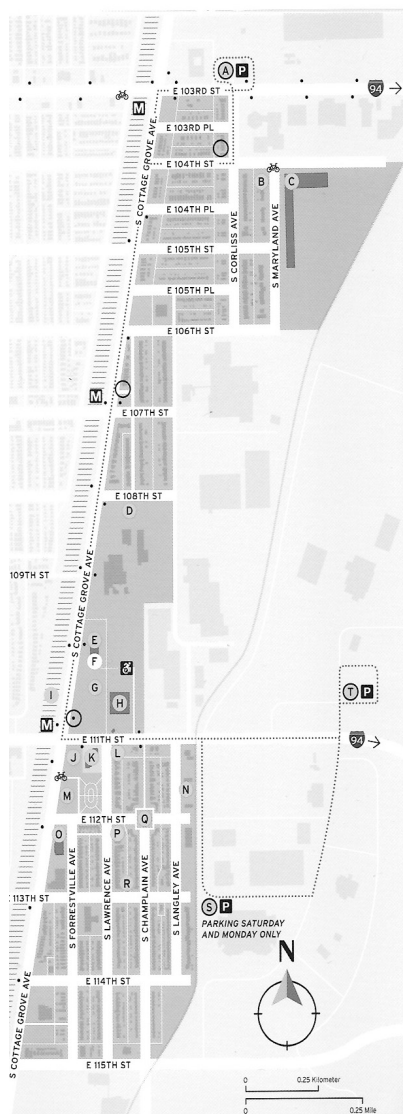
This year, the PCO and HPEO produced the Black History Month event Agency & Activism II: The Underground Railroad with experts Darcel Rockett, Dr. Larry McClellan, and Gliennette Tilly Turner. Our Veterans Day Program led by Tom Shepherd featured numerous guest speakers and a display of Pullman veterans researched and produced by Andy Bullen. The annual Companion Animal Blessing spearheaded by Andy Morgen and Marnee Schereck brought together neighbors and their pets to the HPF Exhibit Hall grounds. Additionally, our community gathered at the PCO Holiday Party, Trunk-or-Treat, and Block Parties throughout the neighborhood; up next is the June PCO and HPEO Red Cross Blood Drive and August Pullman Picnic.

Along with launching our annual membership drive, the May PCO meeting also marks the end of my term limit serving as President. Over the last two years, our organization has been able to innovate new tools to communicate including a virtual membership map and upcoming reimagined website as well as a strategic, long-term investment strategy. It has been an honor to be part of the legacy of those who have served in this role and I am in awe of the brilliance and dedication of our neighbors who come together to do good.

There is much to celebrate and more to do. Thank you to everyone who continues to contribute to our collective efforts in moving Pullman forward. Together, we can!

ByLaws Review Committee Report

The eight-member Bylaws Committee met over the past three months and passed one change, recommending that the boundaries of the Pullman Civic Organization align with those of the Pullman National Historical Park. The committee vote was five members in favor, one abstention, and two absent. The committee submitted the revisions to the Board of Directors and to the general membership in April. Bylaws revisions are to be made available to the membership in the Pullman Flyer no less than 30 days before a vote is taken on proposed changes, thus, voting on the proposed change will be announced in the Flyer one month prior to the scheduled vote. A two-thirds vote by PCO members in good standing, present and voting, is required to approve Bylaws revisions.

The PCO membership will be asked to extend the opportunity for membership to our neighbors in North Pullman. You will hear arguments for and against the changes; that we unite with North Pullman for a stronger and more united Pullman neighborhood, or that we should retain the current boundaries due to limited resources. The committee asks that throughout this discernment process we consider these issues for the greater good of Pullman and with respectfulness in the spirit of community.

The committee understands that the passage of this amendment, while immediately granting residents in North Pullman the right of membership, will take time to fully implement. We recommend that an ad hoc committee be created to connect with our neighbors to the north, establish a process to extend membership, and suggest necessary changes to the bylaws to accommodate the new boundaries. Specifically, this would include distribution of The Pullman Flyer and invitation of representatives from North Pullman to serve on the Board.

The committee recommends the following Bylaws amendment to the PCO membership; note that deletions are marked by strike-through and new language is underlined:

ARTICLE II. MEMBERSHIP
Section 3. For purposes of this Article, the Community of Pullman is defined as the area bounded on the north by the south side of 111th Street, bounded on the south by the north side of 115th Street, bounded on the east by the Right of Way of the Pullman Railroad tracks and bounded on the west by the east side of Cottage Grove Avenue boundaries of the Pullman National Historical Park as established in 2015 as the Pullman National Monument. This area extends from 115th Street to 103rd Street, with the west boundary being Cottage Grove Avenue. The east boundary is the Norfolk Southern Railroad tracks from 115th to 111th Streets and from 106th to 104th Streets, Champlain Avenue from 111th to 109th Streets, Langley Avenue from 109th to 106th Streets, and Corliss Avenue from 104th to 103rd Streets.

A Report of the PCO Beman Committee

Thank you to everyone who attended our Façade Legacy Project & Pullman House History Project presentation on April 27! We were joined by special guest and historian extraordinaire Andy Bullen, who regaled us with fascinating tales of the lives of some of the people who lived and worked in Pullman during its earlier years. Andy also showed us the numerous maps, ephemera, and census data collected over the years to create the House History Project's incredibly vast informational database, offering a peek into the lives of so many individuals and families who once called our town their home.

The Beman Committee was excited to debut the second phase of its Façade Legacy Project, that covering the facades of the northern part of the historic district. Nearly doubling the total number of documented facades in Pullman, the house styles and their layout north of 108th St. provide a fascinating look into how Pullman was developed as a planned community. But more importantly, homeowners now have access to all of the original windows, doors, and porch styles particular to their historic home throughout the entirety of the District. This was truly a labor of love, first initiated back in 2007 with the Committee's initial efforts to document all Beman-designed residential facades, and now happily concluding with the completion of this phase of the project. But we won't stop there – phase three is already well underway, documenting the original chimneys, gutters, and ornamental features for each façade. Please join us in our efforts!

Perhaps most incredibly, all of this volunteer-led research is publicly and easily available at pullman-museum.org. Where else can you find such a wealth of knowledge, all culled from community effort, available for free? Whether you need to plan a façade restoration that complies with Chicago Landmarks, are embarking on a research project, or just want to spend some time taking a trip back in time to see what life was like in Pullman, it's all there and ready for you. A big thanks to Andy Bullen for his incredible knowledge and tech skills, aMa Architecture for their gorgeously rendered façade drawings, Landmarks Illinois for their generous grant funding, and of course the tireless members of the Beman Committee who dedicated so much of their time over the years to this project. We'll have more exciting news in the coming weeks – watch this space for updates!

Green Spaces and Places:

On Finding A Muse

Faithful Reader, I have spent over twenty five years writing garden columns. And, no I am not throwing in the towel, just yet. I am interested however, in giving this column a slightly different slant – at times. It occurs to me that garden making is always, at heart, about Nature celebrating it, altering it, refining it, critiquing it. Oh, and sometimes garden making is about making sure that you have a barbecue pit so that you can enjoy your culinary adventures in the great outdoors. So, I thought that now and then I will highlight places within driving distance to Pullman that I have personally experienced – that are inspiring and peaceful. And no, I am not drawing a separate paycheck from Midwest Living. . .

About an hour and a half from Pullman, at 7337 Thorton Drive, Stevensville, Michigan is Grand Mere State Park. In 1968 it was designated a National Natural Landmark. This wild and wooly National Natural Landmark is hilly, beachy, and gives you an elevation gain of 587 feet. It is primarily an area for nature enjoyment, hiking, and swimming. It covers 985 acres. You must be fairly physically fit, the trails are not wheel chair accessible and the toilet facilities are fairly primitive (outhouses). You can't camp here. But there are three small lakes here, in addition to the magnificent Lake Michigan shoreline, plants you don't normally see in this part of Michigan, some of which are rare and endangered. The sandy beautiful beach can ONLY be reached by foot over steep sand dunes. You need to keep an eye on where you are in the park, because signage is not obvious.

But, if you are looking for a very beautiful, hilly, wild Lake Michigan shoreline within less than a day's drive of Pullman, and you like hiking (take bug spray and suntan lotion, along with a water bottle!) this is the park for you. Oh and please pack your stuff out too. . .and we'll keep talking. . .

I was picking up the books that my cats knocked off the bookshelf upstairs during one of their battles with the 3am forces of evil when my eye caught on the pristine volumes of Remembrance of Things Past.

This month is a year since my father died, and two years since I took over this column after we lost our neighbor Patty Lawson, and I was thinking about trying to find a good rosemary-forward recipe I could offer with Ophelia's famous line "There's rosemary, that's for remembrance..."

I urge you to bake a batch—they're quick and easy and more forgiving than most French desserts. Then eat them warm from the oven with their crisp edges and soft, pillowy centers and see if they won't spark a memory of someone who is now far away.

Madeleines

For coating the pan (yes, you must have a Madeleine pan—you can get them online for cheap):

- 1 TBSP butter
1 and 1/2 tsp flour

For the Madeleines:

- 10 TBSP butter
2 eggs at room temperature
1/2 cup sugar
3 TBSP brown sugar firmly packed
2 tsp vanilla
1/8 tsp salt
1 and 1/4 cups flour
Zest of one large lemon

Preheat oven to 375. Melt the 1 TBSP butter with the 1 1/2 tsp flour and whisk until smooth. Coat the scallops of your pan and set aside for the next batch. In a separate pot, melt the butter, then allow to cool.

Historic Pullman Foundation(HPF) unveils a new exhibit that focuses on the human impact of the Pullman Strike of 1894. Commemorating the 130th anniversary of one of labor's most important moment's, Historic Pullman Foundation presents Passion and Pride: The People of the Pullman Strike opening at Historic Pullman Exhibit Hall on Friday, May 11th.

The new exhibit explores the seminal labor strike through the eyes and words of labor leaders, Pullman workers, politicians and federal authorities - all in a bid to humanize the events and show how the tensions that were present then still resonate today.

The exhibition features an interactive art installation by J.B. Daniels called The Gumball Project: The Pullman Strike; Oversized biography walls with personal effects and stories of the strike's major players; Plus, a deep dive into the political and economic forces that caused the strike, dueling headlines as the press takes sides, and a giant map linking first-hand stories of hardship from families in Pullman and the houses they lived in.


